GAD J. BENSINGER is Professor and Graduate Program Director, Department of Criminal Justice, at Loyola University Chicago. He has a Ph.D from Loyola University Chicago. A former president of the Illinois Academy of Criminology (1978-1979), Dr. Bensinger has researched local criminal justice issues. Prof. Erez has received over one million dollars in State and Federal grants in the U.S. and overseas. She has published extensively articles, books and reports (altogether over 100 articles/chapters). Her publications appear in professional journals such as *Criminology*, *The British Journal of Criminology*, *Justice Quarterly*, *Crime and Delinquency*, *Criminal Law Review*, and others. Prof. Erez served as the editor of *Justice Quarterly* from 1992-1995, has been a guest editor for other journals and she serves on the editorial board of several major professional journals in criminology, criminal law and justice. Prof. Erez current or recent research projects include examination of violence against immigrant women and systemic responses, evaluation of batterer intervention programs and the electronic monitoring of batterers. She is also involved in a study of the policing domestic violence in the Arab/Palestinian community in Israel.

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
